Future Programme



HAPPY 90th BIRTHDAY, CLEM!

Recently, **Clem Newey** celebrated his 90th Birthday! Congratulations and ALL our very best of good wishes to you! **Clem** was born in Stawell where his father was a steam train driver on the Adelaide circuit in 1926; sadly, his mother died when he was 12 and he went to live with and aunt and uncle on a farm in the Lake Goldsmith area where he developed a love of working with sheep. Due to injuries sustained during WW1 the family moved to Mawallock where he met Bev at the P.F.A. I understand she was a very bright young thing and they had to wait to get married until 1958! They took a deep breath and borrowed enough to buy a small dairy farm at Timboon and over the years had four children, two of them adopted as babies. They were VERY active within their community but numerous health problems for Clem saw them move to Ballarat in 1993. Still as active as is humanly possible, family has always been of paramount importance to both Clem and Bev and a big celebration took place in Beaufort in June.



From the Archive; April 1992 The Ghost of the Month

The respect paid to old Ballarat's dignitaries (or villains) is shown by the streets named after them; an unmade, overgrow lane at the foot of Brown Hill "honours" Charles Edwin Jones, politician and conman extraordinaire. He arrived with his father, a tailor, in Melbourne in 1851 and they opened a small shop near St James. They made a comfortable living and kept their heads down until 1861.

After his father died young Charles joined the Orange Lodge, took the pledge, and hated all Catholics. He was elected to Melbourne City Council in 1862 but his civil duties prevented him from due diligence in his shop and he went bankrupt in 1863. The embarrassed Lodge members offered him to their Ballarat East branch as a candidate for the 1864 elections. A little money was provided "on the side". Charlie's fiery oratory, his ability to espouse any popular cause sincerely and his outstretched palm ensured lively and often violent meetings. His battle cry of "Gentlemen and savages, men of Ballarat and Fellows of Bungaree" rallied the Protestant and temperance vote, sweeping him to victory over the disgraced Humffray and rational Dyte. Charlie took money from anyone who would give it; squatters, miners, settlers, friend and foe. He was expelled from parliament for corruption in 1865 but promptly won the by-election for Ballarat West. In 1868 he became editor of the "Evening News', a scurrilous sheet which trod the very fine line of libel. He left hurriedly for America in 1869, having been discovered "in flagrante" by his wife, and was never heard of again. Most curiously, he advocated separation from England and a republic for Australia. How many of his descendants may still be in Ballarat?

Many thanks to the Gold Museum Society in assisting to fund the reproduction and installation of the Eugene von Guerard artwork (Ballarat in the early times; as it appeared in the summer of 1853-54) depicting Mt Warrenheip now displayed in the Eureka Walkway. Visitors are certainly stopping to look out at the view and, considering it is a Ballarat winter, sometimes they can even see the mountain! The advice and funding assistance of the Gold Museum Society in this project is much appreciated.

Winter Wonderlights has proved a phenomenal success for Sovereign Hill with over 90 000 visitors in the four week period. As always I will be visiting a huge range of museums, historic houses, palaces and ancient sites (fortunately my Mum is a fan as well), and I will be busy pinching good ideas that we might be able to implement at the Gold Museum.
